From the Editors Desk

Last Tuesday, we celebrated National Night Out in San Jose, where neighborhoods get together and provide a safe, fun evening with your neighbors. I am afraid that I missed the event. I was at another event that provides a safe, fun evening with your neighbors, only a little more frequently. I was at a San Jose Giants game.

A couple of years ago, I wrote about the San Jose Giants, our own little professional baseball club. The San Jose Giants, a California League (single A advanced) affiliate of the San Francisco Giants, provide a friendly, family-oriented setting for baseball in San Jose. It is really a perfect setting for National Night Out... maybe next year?

While many neighbors know about the San Jose Giants and enjoy going to their games, they may not know that we will probably lose the team in two years. The San Francisco Giants signed an agreement to use San Jose Municipal Stadium through the 2008 season. The city wanted to get a commitment through 2010. The Giants, however, want improved clubhouse and training facilities and will move to get them if necessary, just as the Oakland A's ended a 30 year affiliation with the city of Modesto and moved to the new stadium in Stockton last year.

San Jose Municipal Stadium is a wonderful, historic facility that is showing its age. The stadium was built in 1942 and has had few physical improvements since then. While the city has improved the lighting, the playing surface and added a new video scoreboard, the clubhouses and training facilities remain cramped. Who knew that you needed training facilities in 1942.

Municipal Stadium has a capacity of 4200 and you can almost hear it groaning when more than 3000 show up for a game. When there are large crowds, the ability to enjoy neighborhood baseball drops precipitously. If I wanted to stand in line at a ball game, I would spend twice as much for tickets and drive 50 miles to go to a big league game.

Municipal Stadium needs an upgrade. It needs better clubhouses, training facilities and the capacity to handle large crowds. And the upgrade needs to start within two years or we will lose the team. So what is stopping the upgrade? It can't be the cost, because the upgrade would be less than \$4 million. The upgrade costs would be less than the land acquisition and consulting costs for a downtown baseball stadium.

It must be pride, I can't figure it out otherwise. Our city leaders think that we must have a major league ball club and anything less isn't good enough.

Our neighborhoods take pride in what they have. We see that at National Night Out. Why can't the city do the same? We have a great team. Make the investment in our San Jose Giants. Our neighborhoods will thank you.

This July 4 was a good one. I realized as we arranged for the convertibles for the new babies and moms that we have e a lot of growing families here in Naglee Park. The parade was the biggest ever, and there was a lot of Naglee Park energy and pride that day as we celebrated together. While I was waiting for the July 4 parade to start, former mayoral candidate David Pandori came by and shared that when he was on the campaign trail he had met with communities all over San Jose, but that no other neighborhood had the level of involvement he saw that day at our parade. I agreed, ever proud of our community and all that the neighbors have done together over the years. The parade was started many years ago, yet new people step up every summer to organize the event, and keep the tradition going strong. Our neighbors who continue to support our July 4 parade include local elected leaders, Congressperson Zoe Lofgren and Vice-Mayor Cindy Chavez. Council Candidate Sam Liccardo was a volunteer at the July 4 picnic, working at the registration table.

We are blessed to live in a community where people make efforts to know and support each other. While it is in our own self interest to do so, it is a rarity that people know and reach out to their neighbors. For those of us who are middle-aged, we may remember a time when the front door to our homes was never locked and our families knew and were friendly with all the other families on the block where we lived. For kids in most neighborhoods now, this would be highly unusual. But in Naglee Park, we have a cohesive community that grows stronger all the time. Families know each other and barbecue on weekends, neighbors arrange to bring dinners to families facing illness or the joy of a new baby, people share baby-sitting and car-pooling. Naglee Park is a neighborhood where people work together and help each other.

Our Campus Community Association has supported the development of these networks of involved neighbors. As I write this I note that our Beautification Committee is finalizing a wonderful project that will partner with neighbors to have trees pruned by a licensed arborist. Our canopy of street trees shelters Naglee Park and contributes to its' beauty and character as a neighborhood. We all appreciate the shade of our street trees while walking on a hot summer day.



Washington **Report**By Congresswoman Zoe Lofgren

For the last few months, preserving net neutrality – Internet users' freedom to access whatever content, devices and services they want online – has become a hot topic in Silicon Valley and Washington, D.C. Because of a change in FCC rules last summer, telecom companies could now control what we access over the Internet by giving better connections to their favored content and charge money for that privilege. Only by making new laws that guarantee net neutrality, will we be able to stop "the pipes" from turning the Internet into the equivalent of cable TV.

In Congress, I have been fighting to protect net neutrality in my Committee and on the House floor. This May, I introduced legislation in the House Judiciary Committee with the Committee's Republican Chairman and top Democrat that amends existing antitrust laws to protect net neutrality. Unfortunately, this bipartisan bill was not allowed to be voted on by the House of Representatives when the House debated updates to our telecom laws in June, but I still urged the protection of net neutrality on the House floor during this debate.

Many of our neighbors have discussed this issue with me over dinner or at the grocery store, and we all know what's at stake. More than almost anywhere else in the country, here in Silicon Valley, we understand firsthand how a free Internet empowers ordinary people to create innovations that change the world. The level playing field of the Internet should not be destroyed. I will continue to work in Congress to protect net neutrality and hope that if you are interested in this topic you will make your views known.

In September we will host our 2006 Bark in the Park. Bark is also a Naglee Park tradition, one of our offerings to the larger San Jose community (and beyond). Volunteering for Bark develops new leadership in our neighborhood, and the proceeds from Bark both fund our neighborhood projects and allow us to make contributions to local schools. Naglee Park is a strong neighborhood, and shares both our collective talents and resources, supporting the larger downtown community in many ways.

We have received a number of recent inquiries recently regarding the streetlights planned for William Street, and wanted to provide information regarding this project. You may have seen the bright dots along William Street; these indicate where the Redevelopment Agency is planning to install a sidewalk-illuminating reproduction historic street light. The existing streetlights will also remain in place. If there is a dot in front of your home, and you would like the location of the light shifted, please let the CCA Board know as soon as possible. We are promised that no trees will be harmed and that the Agency will work with the neighborhood to do everything possible to limit disruption by the installation of the lights.

In a meeting earlier this summer with San Jose Redevelopment Agency Executive Director Harry Mavrogenes and San Jose City Attorney Rick Doyle, we were told that the Redevelopment Agency plans to move forward in removing Naglee Park from the Redevelopment Plan Area. They intend to install the lights to complete the pedestrian corridor project that is planned to stretch across William Street through all of downtown. As soon as that project is completed we have been promised that the Agency will take steps to remove our neighborhood from the Redevelopment Project Area.



DR. MARK HOPKINS:

PIONEER NAGLEE PARK DOCTOR

Dr. Mark Forest Hopkins was an innovative neighborhood physician who chose his home here in 1914 long before there was a medical complex on East Santa Clara Street. His father, Rev. Thomas B. Hopkins, had served in the Union Army and came to California at the end of the Civil War. Perhaps he named his son for the Big Four robber baron whose hotel still stands in San Francisco.

Our Mark first rode to house calls on horseback, but is reputed to have purchased the first car in San Jose in order to get to his patients faster. In the early years he worked out of O'Connor Hospital. The first doctor to use x-ray technology, he suffered severe burns from over-exposure. In 1918 he became a victim of the flu epidemic just at the time when his first daughter was to be born. Fortunately he survived. He moved his office to the Medico-Dental Building at 6th and Santa Clara Streets when it opened in 1928.

The doctor and his wife Hazel raised three children, Mark Jr., Floy and Clara, in Naglee Park at 485 South 16th. Mark Jr. was a navigator on U.S. bomber flights over Germany during World War II, and after the war he became well-known for his San Jose insurance agency. He died while on vacation in Belize in 1992.

Active to the end, Dr. Mark Hopkins lived to the age of 74, dying on October 28, 1952. Services were held at the old First Methodist Church at 5th and Santa Clara. He saw many new medical innovations during his long career, but I'll bet he always missed his horse.



Let's Be Prepared By William O'Connell

Naglee Park Prepared is on a roll: we held our first simulated disaster drill in two years, in April, and this is my second article on parparedness in two issues of the Advisor.

When we had the great Coyote Creek flood some years ago, many of the neighbors volunteered to help, which was great but too late. Most of the damage had been done. As a neighborhood we were not fully prepared. When the Big One hits, we need to be prepared, as individuals, families, and community.

I urge you to re-read Jeff Hare¹s article in the February Advisor. Note the emphasis he gives to being prepared for any disaster. And note his specific recommendations. These will help you have your family ready. The TV visuals after the Œ98 Loma Preita quake should have educated us to the danger of fire. Re-read my article in the February Advisor about preventing fire in your home. And get a large fire-extinquisher--several of them: one for each car and one for the house.


To make NP ready, we will need several people on each block to be trained. I am not talking about technical training. Some basic training is necessary so that people don't show up and ask, "What can we do?" After a disaster we will not have time to train you. We need you trained now.

If you do not have a NP Prepared person on your block, please volunteer or nominate someone. We need at least three persons on each block to be trained. I can do the training in a half-hour. If your block does not have trained responders in a disaster, your block will not be checked for up to hours after the event. Professional responders will not be available. We as a neighborhood will have to be self-sufficient for up to three days.

If you desire more training, San Jose Prepared has on-going trainings, as does the Red Cross. Let me know if you take one of these.

Current block monitors/responders: now is the time to recuit helpers, to learn which homes need a green preparedness manual and tell me, to pick up the Flu Pandemic brochures and disaster survey sheets from my porch.
