Bark in the Park Invests over \$100,000 in Our Community!

Bark in the Park 2009 was a great success. 14,500 people and 3600 dogs enjoyed a great sunny day visiting 90 Dog Product, Service, and Rescue Vendors. Dogs were entertained by flying dogs, racing dogs, herding dogs and obidient dogs while their owners watched their best friend have the best day of 2009.



This was the 12th time that Bark in the Park has been held in the Naglee Park neighborhood and organized by the Campus Community Association. This year, Bark in the Park also achieved a significant milestone. Bark in the Park has now invested and contributed over \$100,000 in our greater community. What began as a day in the park for our neighbors and their dogs has grown to be the largest dog oriented festival in the United States. Bark in the Park has earned great respect as a very well run, safe, fun, family friendly event that is fiscally responsible.

Bark in the Park investments and contributions over the past 12 years have gone to CCA Beautification, Animal Service Non-Profits, our local schools, and to our surrounding neighborhood associations.

Bark makes an annual contribution to CCA Beautification for its many projects and also makes contributions for larger projects managed by Beautification. Two recent large projects managed by CCA Beautification that have been funded with Bark in the Park Funds have been a neighborhood wide Tree Trimming

Bark in the Park funds have also funded ongoing CCA Beautification efforts like Tree Planting and Median Plantings. CCA Beautification has added to these projects with contributions from neighbors and grants. Bark is also a source for funding our various community building events like the 4th of July, the Holiday Get Together and Naglee Park Open Studios.

Bark in the Park has also contributed to Animal Service non-profits, principally the Humane Society Silicon Valley and San Jose Animal Care Center. Bark also contributes to our local downtown schools: Horace Mann, Lowell, Selma Olinder, and San Jose Academy.

Bark also have been able to help out our adjacent neighborhood associations with directed contributions over the past 12 years. Bark in the Park also helped all neighborhoods in Santa Clara County with contributions to the United Neighborhoods of Santa Clara County. Bark has contributed to community projects like Friends of Ryland Park and for the construction of O'Donnell Gardens.

So what is the secret to Bark's success. A very dedicated group of volunteers who understand that Bark is more than a Dog Festival, it is an opportunity to show what a neighborhood can do when it works together towards a common goal.

Pres' Says

As we close out this mild summer of 2009 I think about the things we did in Naglee Park. Some of those things are traditional celebrations; 4th of July and National Night Out, others are processes that will be with us for a while; Water District issues, and then there are those activities that are singular but take time to accomplish; banners on light poles and a sign and gateway to William Street Park.

The traditional 4th of July celebrations brought the neighborhood together again at the bake-off contest, the race, the parade, and the BBQ at William Street Park for good food, good music, and good people. And everyone even had time left over for an evening party and fireworks.

In August, National Night Out in the neighborhood continued with the good food and people mingling throughout the neighborhood. Thanks to Peter and Kris Dessau, Alan Hackler, Dave and Jane Guinther, Erik and Sheri Suomela, and The Thomson's for hosting NNO in Naglee Park.

Meanwhile, Naglee Park and other central San Jose neighborhoods continue to wait for the much anticipated Santa Clara Valley Water District, City of San Jose, and community task force on Coyote Creek flood protection. The Water District has delayed convening the task force and the community input that goes with the task force until they can study other creek flood control options. These options, we are told, include modifications and/or improvements to Anderson Dam and Reservoir. But since we have not convened a public task force there is no public commitment to studying such options. It is now expected the task force will convene sometime in November. In the meantime, CCA has formed the CCA Coyote Creek Work Group consisting of affected neighbors who will develop strategies and communications regarding the creek with the CCA Board.

The Beautification Committee has been working with the City of San Jose and the Redevelopment Agency for over a year to place Naglee Park banners on light poles on certain streets in the neighborhood. The banner design is ready, but, the city has decided to develop a Banner Policy to include guidelines for all neighborhoods. So we are on hold until the policy works its way through the city.

Beautification has also been busy working with the city on a new sign and gateway to William Street Park. This will be a joint project between the city and CCA. Designs are complete and engineering is in process. This too will take some time, but it is well on its way to beautifying the neighborhood and park.

While the weather has been somewhat mild this summer, the best time of year, early fall, is coming. Not too warm, not too chilly. Enjoy!



Proposed New Willam Street Park Sign



CCA Beautification has been working in partnership with the City of San Jose Parks Recreation and Neighborhood Services on a new sign for the William Street Park. The proposed design is above and will be placed at the corner of South 16th and East William Streets. The sign will serve as an entrance to the park and will have more visability than the current sign.

The sign construction would be paid for by the Campus Community Association (CCA) using Bark in the Park funds and the City of San Jose would pay for the installation and stone pillars. The CCA will also be seeking grant funds to help with the construction.

The CCA Board is soliciting input on the proposed design. The design will be presented at the CCA General Meeting in October.

Update on Flood Control

Flood control and prevention is important for San Jose. I'm sure many of you remember the devastating effects of the 1995 Guadalupe River flood of downtown San Jose. The flood damaged about 300 homes and businesses, costing millions of dollars in repairs. My own district office was among the buildings flooded. Flooding along the Guadalupe is now a thing of the past because of the successful Guadalupe flood control and park project funded by the City of San Jose, the County of Santa Clara, the Santa Clara Valley Water District (SCVWD) and the Federal government.

The Coyote can also pose a threat. In 1997, Jackson Street between Coyote Creek and North 22nd Street was flooded by 2-3 feet of water, and one home on South 17th Street was flooded by nearly 8 feet of water. In 1998, the Coyote Creek overbanked again, as the mobile home park along North 13th Street was flooded, causing the residents to evacuate.

While prevention of flooding is important, progress can only be made in collaboration with neighbors and the community. I'm aware that many in the neighborhood were alarmed when SCVWD posted notices earlier this year about a "project" that appeared to be ready to go. Unfortunately, the notices were misleading since there is currently only a study of what may be possible. There is no project as such.

Neighbors quite properly raised concerns and the good news is that you were heard. The water district is currently exploring ideas advanced by Naglee Park to explore new ideas for flood prevention including an analysis of Anderson Dam and upstream issues.

Construction of flood control projects in our community is almost always a partnership between the SCVWD, local governments and the federal government. I want to assure neighbors that a project simply cannot proceed unless consensus is reached on what to do. That means that neighbors along the entire length of the Coyote must be consulted in an effort to forge a workable plan that provides flood protection without incurring the destruction of neighborhoods

NAGLEE PARK OPEN STUDIOS TWO: CALL FOR ARTISTS AND VOLUNTEERS!

Does it feel like we just enjoyed our very first Naglee Park Open Studios? It was an amazing beginning, with literally hundreds of curious and supportive neighbors turning out to meet our artist neighbors and experience their talents first hand. Well, since the planning cycle for that first event was way too short and pressured, this is the official announcement that planning is just now beginning for Naglee Park Open Studios TWO. More planning, artist outreach and sorting time – that is a great concept. So this is the official first call for prospective artists and volunteers of many genres. The Steering Committee needs a little or lots of your help!

If you missed NPOS ONE, first you must make a point of not letting that happen again. It was that good, with lots of amazing artists for nearly every taste and type of art. It all started from a chance conversation with 12th Street artist Ted Fullwood (with the tile mosaic in his front sidewalk), and questions about the gorgeous clay pottery arrayed down his driveway and front yard. In that conversation it became clear artists like to *create* art; the business of getting it to their public can get overlooked. With art appreciators all around us, the idea of creating connections right here in the neighborhood was born. With suggestions from several other artist neighbors, an email query to the list, and the help of a great many neighbors and supporters, Naglee Park Open Studios was underway. Eventually, it included 16 artists at 13 sites including the continuum of: college students for their first show to many with a lifetime of creating beautiful work in pastels, sculpture, landscape design, international photo portraits, century old French paintings, pottery & porcelain, restored frames and antique clocks, children's toys, fancy dog outfits – this neighborhood rocked! And that's not all -- don't forget the delight at seeing and talking with neighbors from more than your block, every twenty feet, all day long!

EVENT DAY: Sunday, June 6, 2010 – put this on *all* of your calendars!! Opening words to starting the planning for Naglee Park Open Studios TWO: LOTS of artists and volunteers are needed. There is something for every schedule.

ARTISTS: The number one purpose of Naglee Park Open Studios is to showcase our neighborhood artists, and help them to share their work with others, and for most, to create the opportunity for some sales. You see the range of art in the first event. A rich mix is wonderful for everybody – remembering this is a family event. Artists interested in even POSSIBLY participating are encouraged to let us know early. Now would be good.

VOLUNTEERS: Volunteers are needed at any and all levels.

Steering Committee – Some members of the first Steering Committee agreed to continue, which is a good thing, but only a start. This is your chance to have a real impact on this amazing event. The earliest discussions are just getting underway – this includes several hours at regular intervals with some flexibility. Needed: creative and good ideas OR event-related experience OR willing to coordinate a portion of the event. Generalists are good, too, but we specifically need a Publicity Coordinator, a Volunteer Coordinator, and an Artist Outreach Coordinator.

General Volunteers – There are lots of smaller jobs that are crucial, too, such as making confirmation phone calls, dropping off publicity items, working in an artist's home the day of the event, shopping, making up the artist packets, etc. Miscellaneous gofers with only an hour or so absolutely help everything to fall into place particularly as event day approaches.

UP: Maybes are OK at this point – we can firm them up later. Simply send an email to stephsorenson@earthlink.net including your name, email address, phone number and how you wish to be involved.

With your help, as many of you as can carve off a small or large chunk of time, this second year of Naglee Park Open Studios will be fantastic!! Think about what you loved most about the first event – and tell us what to keep. Help us to fix the parts that need it. What are your new ideas? Remember the number one goal of this event is to help our artists show and sell their work. The more we plan around this, and what will help us to creatively do this, the better. The more artists and helper neighbors involved in this percolating process, the better Naglee Park Open Studios TWO will be for all of us. We need to hear from you – tentative offers are welcome -- email NOW!



Tips for a Safe Halloween!

Halloween can be a fun holiday for kids, but a worrisome one for parents. Concerns about children's safety--whether they are out in the neighborhood or back home with bags of booty--can darken the day more quickly than a black cat. But not to worry! To make Halloween a treat, follow these safety tips.

Make sure your kids dress up safely.

- Make sure costumes are flame retardant so children aren't in danger near burning jack-olanterns.
- Keep costumes short to prevent trips, falls, and other bumps in the night.
- Try make-up instead of a mask. Masks can be hot and uncomfortable, and they can obstruct a child's vision--a dangerous thing when kids are crossing streets and going up and down steps.
- Make sure kids wear light colors or put reflective tape on their costumes.

Make trick-or-treating trouble free.

- Create a map of a safe trick-or treating route.
- Trick-or-treaters should always be in groups so they aren't a tempting target for real-life goblins. Parents should accompany young children.
- Make sure older kids trick-or-treat with friends. Together, map out a safe route so you will know where they are going. Tell them to stop only at familiar homes where the outside lights are on.
- Try to get your kids to trick-or-treat while it's still light out. If it's dark, make sure someone has a flashlight and pick well-lighted streets.
- Make sure kids know never to enter a stranger's house or car.
- Remind kids to keep a safe distance from moving cars.

Check all treats before eating.

• It's hard for kids to hold back from eating their treats until they get home. One way to keep

trick-or-treaters from digging in while they're still out is to feed them a meal or a snack beforehand.

- Check out all candy in a well-lighted place when your trick-or-treater gets home.
- What to eat? Only unopened candies and other treats that are in original wrappers. Don't forget to inspect fruit and homemade goodies for anything suspicious. By all means remind kids not to eat everything at once or they'll be feeling pretty ghoulish for while!
- Halloween can be a lot of fun for parents and kids alike--if everybody remembers the tricks and treats of playing it safe.


