You may be aware that Naglee Park Open Studios (NPOS) will soon be appearing before your very eyes – on **Sunday, June 6 from 11-6**. If you missed our debut event last summer, it is our opportunity to showcase neighborhood artists of all kinds (child appropriate), who tell us about and sell their work in their home studios or nearby. This in itself, is a major treat, repeated all around the neighborhood -- but that's not all. What we learned last year is it is also an amazing opportunity to see and talk with those beyond our block, visit many homes (do we love that, or what?), and relax and enjoy our neighborhood together. More than 200 people took part last year, and many artists sold out, which they said was unprecedented for similar events. Orders for commissions were also common, artists reported. In this issue, we now have exciting details to further tempt you. NOTE: Last year we had 16 artists at 13 sites; this year we already have 20 artists, including many newcomers. Don't forget, though, NPOS is possible only with LOTS of volunteers to help.

# Pres' Says

Many of you most likely are aware the City of San Jose is struggling with reduced revenues and increased expenses in the upcoming fiscal year budget. The County and the State have similar if not greater issues. Unfortunately the biggest losers in these fiscal issues appear to be residents and neighborhoods. As the city cuts services rather than reduce their cost of service we are finding that residents and property owners are being forced either directly by the city or out of necessity to provide their own services. We are now responsible for maintaining city street trees, repairing the sidewalks that are damaged by the city trees, and maintaining liability insurance in the event the street trees deteriorate and cause damage. We are being asked to fund an endowment for city parks, to volunteer to maintain city property, and to make donations to keep city pools open. At the same time a majority of the city council has failed to work to reduce the cost of services delivered by the city to residents and neighborhoods. It appears by default and out of necessity many of our services are being outsourced to private parties namely residents and neighborhoods.

What can we in Naglee Park do? We can continue programs such as the Tree Pruning Program which the CCA Beautification Committee has sponsored the last few years. The CCA plans to roll out another round of street tree pruning next year whereby the neighborhood bands together to obtain discounted pricing on tree pruning services and the CCA donates grants to even further reduce the costs to neighbors. We can also look to start new programs similar to the tree pruning program such as sidewalk repairs. We also have the Median Buddies who keep the plantings in the medians beautiful and green. Your ideas and desire to administer new programs and teams are welcome. Send me an email at [president@nagleepark.org](mailto:president@nagleepark.org) if you have an idea and/or would like to work on these programs.

One such program is in progress as the Beautification Committee has been busy working with the city on a new sign and gateway to William Street Park. This will be a joint project between the city and CCA. Engineering plans have been developed and are undergoing small revisions. Next the plans will go to the city for plan review prior to construction of the pedestals, fabrication of the metalwork sign, and installation of the sign. The CCA plans to have the project completed this summer.


Two retail business issues have come to the forefront in the neighborhood this winter. The first deals with the cannabis club at E. Santa Clara Street and S. 14<sup>th</sup> Street. The city has no regulations regarding such clubs and is working through code enforcement to make sure the clubs are good neighbors and operating within the laws of the city. The CCA is working with Councilmember Sam Liccardo's office to see if we can enact city codes to regulate the clubs or at a minimum require a Conditional Use Permit for such businesses. The second issue deals with Walgreen's application to sell alcohol at its stores including the store at the corner of E. Santa Clara Street and S. 17<sup>th</sup> Street. Should the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) grant Walgreen's a permit to sell alcohol, the CCA will provide input on the Conditional Use Permit for the 17<sup>th</sup> Street store. Concerns have been raised that alcohol sales at a location in close proximity to Coyote Creek, with its homeless population, and Roosevelt Park could result in problems along Santa Clara Street and within the neighborhood.

The CCA works because of members like you. Keep up the good work and have a great spring.

# Naglee Park Prepared Needs You Before a Disaster Strikes!!

## Regarding: the need for Block Monitors

*Every block, should have two. Every cross street should have two.*

**Block monitors could save your life.** In the event of a major disaster, like an earthquake, your Block Monitor may be your first emergency responder, and your only communication source. Phones and computers may not work. *With a block monitor it may take a rescue crew minutes not hours to arrive.*

**Does your block have a Block Monitor? Check the map.** As soon as possible after a major disaster, Block Monitors walk their block and do an emergency assessment. They report to one of two Naglee Park “command centers” which can communicate by short wave and provide available resources or trained personnel.

## Could you be a Block Monitor?

A Block Monitor should:

- Be able: this job requires some walking possibly running.
- Be at home most of the time, or share the job with someone else with a complementary schedule.
- Get to know the people on your block. Possibly create a block directory.
- Give every household on your block an Emergency Prepared Manual. *Available through NPP.*
- Encourage householders to keep the manual handy, near a front window.
- Explain the window card communication system.

RED	=	“Help Now!”
YELLOW	=	“Help Later OK”
GREEN	=	“All OK”

- Notify your block of upcoming drills. *A flyer is available for this purpose.*
- During a drill or as soon as possible after a major disaster; walk your block and determine the status of the people in each house by “reading” the color cards. If no card is displayed, knock.
- Report leaking gas smells.
- Attend at least one neighborhood class to learn to fill out assessment sheets, report or handle gas leaks, assist or request specific types of assistance.

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Please, read further. Block Monitors are only part of Naglee Park Prepared.

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**The purpose of Naglee Park Prepared is to** organize the neighborhood to prepare and respond as best we can to a major disaster.

In such an event, first responders like the fire, police, and paramedics may be overwhelmed. **NPP will quickly attempt to locate, help or find assistance for persons in need.**

Confusion may reign, it may be night, all lights may be out, it may be raining, TV and radio may not work, the extent of the damage may be unknown, family may be scattered around town. **NPP will try to quickly determine who should be looked for, especially the elderly and disabled.**

Further, we may expect it to take 72 hours or more for emergency aid to reach us. **NPP encourages and assists neighbors to make provision for emergency shelter, food, water, and sanitary facilities.**

**Other NPP volunteer positions are:** planning committee, training, communications, special skills (medical personnel, radio operator).

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# Naglee Park Prepared

In a city-wide disaster, such as a severe earthquake, first-responders (fire, police, paramedics) are overwhelmed. And so our neighborhood must be prepared to fend for itself. Naglee Park Prepared is your response team. We are getting reorganized and enlivened.

I am handing the reins to Rich Eilbert, who will be managing trainings, meetings, and day-to-day operations.

Our most immediate need is to recruit block monitors. We will be calling our list of monitors to confirm who are active. And then we need to recruit more monitors. If your block does not have a monitor (ask around), volunteer or find someone else to nominate. If you live between Santa Clara and San Carlos streets, call or email Rich (275-1460; [riche@stanfordalumni.org](mailto:riche@stanfordalumni.org)). If you live between San Carlos and Orvis, call or email Chris Finn (287-7387; [finncl@gmail.net](mailto:finncl@gmail.net)).

Here is a brief description of the duties of a block monitor:

Get to know the people on your block. Give everyone an Emergency Prepared manual (green). Tell them to keep the manual close to a front window. Study the manual so your own home is secure and ready.

Recruit a helper to help you survey your block after a severe earthquake or other disaster. And recruit a backup for when you or your helper are/is out of town or in any other way unable to do your tasks.

The survey: you will need two survey sheets, one for each side of your block. After a severe earthquake, after you have made your own home and your family-safe, walk your block, noting the status of each home. Bring the survey sheets to the incident command center. (222 S. 14th or 529 S. 14th)

If you are new to the neighborhood and do not have an emergency prepared manual, contact Chris or Rich. Block monitors are important. They do the first damage assessment on your block. If your block does not have a monitor, it may take hours, rather than minutes, before a rescue crew can reach you.

If you have special skills (first aid training, construction trades, ham radio operator, etc.), let Chris or Rich know.

Being prepared lessens panic, disorder, and greater damage to people and property. Let's do it.

## Going Native Garden Tour

The California Native Plant Society's (CNPS) 8th annual Going Native Garden Tour is coming up on April 18, 2010. There is no admission charge, and the only requirement is advance registration. The tour promotes environmentally friendly gardening practices through the use of California native plants. Naturally adapted to our soils and climate, native plants provide improved habitat and require less irrigation, fertilization and pesticides. Most tour gardens are home gardens, which are open on tour day for viewing by the public in a do-it-yourself, open house format. Last year more than 50 gardens in Santa Clara Valley and the Peninsula participated in the tour, each demonstrating the unique aesthetic appeal of a landscape designed with California native plants.

## King Library in Second Year of National Endowment for the Humanities Challenge Grant

San José State University Library Dean and Naglee Park resident, Ruth Kifer is pleased to announce that thanks to nearly 100 generous donors, the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Library was able to raise more than \$150,000 in its first year of a National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) challenge grant, thus securing a donation of more than \$50,000 from the NEH for a total of \$200,000.

The much sought after NEH grant supports the University Library's efforts to strengthen and enrich its humanities digital collections, which are accessible to the SJSU community as well as to public visitors. The library seeks to acquire digital resources in the humanities to:

- Provide public access to the highest-quality humanities resources available, encouraging lifelong learning for the citizens of Silicon Valley.
- Ensure that the library keeps pace with the increasing reliance on digital resources supporting the university's humanities academic programs and scholarly research.
- Strengthen the university's ability to recruit and support top humanities scholars, expanding and enriching the education of our students.

"In order for our democracy to survive, American citizens need to know the ideas that have shaped and continue to influence our nation," says outgoing NEH chairman Bruce Cole. "By funding the nation's highest-quality humanities projects, the [NEH] offers the opportunity for our citizens to discuss the important role philosophy, art, literature, and history can play in our lives."

The opportunity to receive matching funds from the NEH will continue for three more years. Now in its second year, the library's goal is to raise \$300,000, which will earn an additional NEH award of \$100,000. For every donation the University Library receives towards the endowment, the NEH will match it by one-third, up to a goal of \$1.5 million.

**Median Caretakers adopt a median.** It's theirs to weed, mulch, prune, plant, sweep and water. This is a weekly or bi-weekly maintenance project.

**Water Houses** are near one or more medians. The homeowners give permission for Median Caretakers and Median Buddies to use their water for nearby medians.

**Cart Houses** are within a block of one or more medians. The homeowner maintains an accessible green debris recycling cart for use by the Median Caretakers and Median Buddies.

**The Watering Team** keeps the abandoned medians alive. Caralie Olsen plus a "Buddy" drive Jim Norvell's pick-up truck, which is rigged to carry and pump grey water from Willam Street Park. This a dry season job, it takes about one and a half hours, a week, by arrangement.

**Median Buddies** work as a group on the abandoned medians, and provide booster service for the Median Caretakers, if requested. MB's are "out" 8:30 AM to 10:00 AM most Tuesday mornings. Coffee after; better than fun.

And why do they come back ten minutes later to empty the other bin?


Why did they have to dig up our street to replace 80-year old gas pipes in the middle of a major recession?


